Greater Toronto Area Does not need a Casino

With a huge chunk of money to be made if a Toronto casino is constructed, it is not something unusual that the health consequences of higher gambling activities do not get the necessary consideration in the media in comparison with the reports of powerful lobbying. Private sponsors, construction businesses, in addition to the city, “everyone stands to make money from a casino” (Quilty et al, 2014). On the other hand, a Toronto Public Health report informs that constructing a casino within the city could lead to intensifying societal discrimination and increase in the occurrence as well as severity of ‘problem gambling’ (Dragicevic et al, 2011) within the area.

Problem gambling is an attitude towards gambling activities that leads towards incessant or intermittent loss of control on gamble; obsession with gambling as well as with money to be used in gambling; unreasonable and absurd thoughts; and persistence of activity regardless of the negative outcome. According to the official reports, people in adolescent years, seniors, individuals of inferior socio-economic condition, and new settlers in Canada are mainly susceptible to problem gambling. Toronto Public Health has published four detailed accounts on the casino, together with one that concentrates on alleviating the harmful outcomes of such activities.

Literature Review

This literature review discusses three articles by Giles (2007), Dwivedi (2009) and Hogan (2001) which address the question of India's portrayal in the novel *Midnight's Children* by Salman Rushdie. In his article on the writing style employed in *Midnight's Children*, Giles portrays India as a challenge for the historian. The focus of the article is on Saleem's project of writing, or rather rewriting, the history of India. In the course of exploring this aspect of the novel, Giles (p. 183) portrays India as a diverse mix of heritage, histories and cultures which makes the rewriting of the history of India as a nation a veritable challenge. In Giles' article (p. 183), India is also portrayed as a paradoxical entity which offers a source of heritage as well as a modern destiny that needs to be explored. In large, India is portrayed as a country that defies every effort to impose any kind of structure upon it.

Dwivedi's article shows how India is portrayed in the novel *Midnight's Children* while keeping the focus on the growth of the country parallel to the growth of the protagonist Saleem Sinai. Although in this paper, the challenges that India and Saleem experience are not ignored, the interest of the author lies in exploration and illumination of the historical identities of the two. Dwivedi (p. 383) almost portrays Indian anthropomorphically while drawing the parallels between Saleem's growth as

The main argument of Kathleen Kelleher in her article, "Pink Ribbons and Beyond: Ways to Help in the Fight Against Breast", is apart from buying the pink ribbon products to support the cause of breast cancer prevention, nurses can perform more positive actions as a frontline healthcare providers to make a real difference.
